#### METHODOLOGY



#### QUANTITATIVE RESEARCH INSTRUMENT

An online survey of 1063 Quebecers aged 18+ was completed between February 24-26, 2023, using Leger's online panel.

No margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample (i.e. a web panel in this case). For comparative purposes, though, a probability sample of 1063 respondents would have a margin of error of  $\pm 3.0\%$ , 19 times out of 20.

#### ABOUT LEGER'S ONLINE PANEL

Leger's online panel has approximately 400,000 members nationally and has a retention rate of 90%.



## Half of Quebecers (48%) are concerned about the future of Quebec's cultural autonomy if Bill C-11 is passed.

This includes one in five (19%) who are *very* concerned. Men (vs. women), older Quebecers (aged 55+ vs. those younger), urbanites (vs. those in other areas), and those whose first language is French (vs. English or other) are significantly more likely to feel Bill C-11 is a threat to Quebec's cultural autonomy, and in fact, more likely to express that they are very concerned.

The House of Commons is currently considering Bill C-11, which will amend the Broadcasting Act and allow the CRTC to regulate online content shared and accessed by Canadians.

The Quebec National Assembly recently passed a unanimous motion expressing concern about certain elements of the bill, which it considers a threat to Quebec's cultural autonomy.
